"Pete" Wimberly, international hotel architect whose George J. designsinclude the Sheraton Waikiki, Sheraton Maui and Coco Palms on Kauai, died . Saturday Dec. 30, 1995 in Queen's Hospital after a long illness. Wimberly, who would have celebrated his 81st birthday Jan. 16, was dubbed "the man who changed the face of the Pacific." He was born in Ellensburg, Wash., and moved to Hawaii in 1940. In 1945, he became a founding partner and president of the Honolulu architectural firm now known as Wimberly Allison Tong & Goo. "He was truly and architect's architect," said Gerald L. Allison, who joined the Wimberly group in 1957. "he gave his best and demanded the best from his associates. To me, he was both icon and legend, and it is his work against which comparisons are made. Gregory M.B. Tong, Wimberly chairman emeritus, who joined the firm in 1953, praised Wimberly's vision. "Long ago --even before the post-World War II building boom in Hawaii and while we were only a 12-person firm -- Pete realized Hawaii was going to be too small. He encouraged us to look outward." The firm, marking its 50th anniversary last year, grew to do business in 35 countries, with branch offices in Newport Beach, Calif.; London and Singapore. Design of the Princess Kaiulani Hotel came in. 1960, Bank of Hawaii Waikiki branch in 1967, Sheraton Kauai in 1968 along with projects in Indonesia, Western Samoa, Sri Lanka, New Zealand? Australia, Singapore and Japan. An early indication of Wimberly's impact was his postwar renovating of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel, especially his work on its Diamond Head Wing. Wimberly also demonstrated his climate responsive and culture flair with the Waikikian and Surf Rider hotels and the South Wing of Mauna Kea Beach Hotel. His other trademarks in the 1960s were Hotel Tahiti, Hotel Bora Bora and Hotel Tahara'a, all i French Polynesia; the Fijian Hotel in Fiji Gov. Rex Lee Auditorium and the Pago Pago Inter-Continental Hotel, both in American Samoa. Wimberly moved from firm president to chairman of the board in 1980, remaining in that post until 1987. He continued as firm consultant

until his death, working on a Philippines project as recently as late last year. Wimberly earned a bachelor's degree in architecture from the University of Washington in 1937. He was in a wartime. Civil service position at Pearl Harbor, also with Contractors Pacific Naval Air Bases, Honolulu; and a draftsman and designer in Seattle, Los Angeles and Phoenix before starting the architectural firm that bears his name. By 1954, he had helped design the Waikiki branch of the Bishop National Bank, Rattan Art Gallery and Honolulu Gas Co. building, Ala Wai Apartment Hotel, Don the Beachcombers, Canlis Restaurant and Bishop Estate homes in Waialae-Kahala. Of many honors he received, noteworthy is the Aga Khan Award. for Architecture (1983) for the Tanjong Jara Beach Hotel and Rantau Abang Visitors Center in Teregganu, Malaysia. In 1987, Wimberly was named charter recipient of Restaurant and Hotel Design magazine's Platinum Circle Award for "his pioneering role in bringing culture and environment sensitive resort hotels to the Pacific and its rim nations." Other designs that bear Wimbely's stamp are the Hyatt Regency. at Hemmeter Center, Aloha Towers Condominiums, Hilton Hawaiian Village Tapa .Tower, Sheraton Molokai Hotel and Maui Land and Pineapple Co. headquarters. Outside of work, Wimberly enjoyed racing sports ears. He called himself a Mickey Mouse driver who was old and crafty. Wimberly is survived by wife Walton J.; first wife Janet B.; daughter Heather M. Beech; and two grandchildren. Services will be at 5 p.m. Monday at Central Union Church. Aloha attire. [SB 04/01/1996]

Gordon Mervyn "Wilkie" Wilkinson, 84, of Honolulu, died Jan. 17, 1995.
